Recently, the Iowa Board of Medicine took the following actions:

[Theodore J. Anfinson, M.D.](#), a 57-year-old Iowa-licensed psychiatrist who formerly practiced in Iowa City, Iowa, and currently practices in Decatur, Georgia, had the terms of his probation terminated by the Board on January 11, 2013. On April 3, 2003, the Board charged Dr. Anfinson with engaging in a sexual relationship with a female patient. Dr. Anfinson subsequently married the patient. On March 30, 2004, Dr. Anfinson entered into a Settlement Agreement with the Board and his Iowa medical license was indefinitely suspended. Dr. Anfinson subsequently completed a professional sexual misconduct evaluation and treatment at a Board-approved program. On June 24, 2005, the Board reinstated Dr. Anfinson's Iowa medical license and placed him on indefinite probation subject to Board monitoring. On January 11, 2013, the Board voted to terminate the terms of Dr. Anfinson's probation.

[Jeffery M. Jauron, D.O.](#), a 36-year-old Iowa-licensed physician who formerly practiced family medicine in Moline, Illinois, and currently practices at the Rock Island Arsenal Medical Clinic in Rock Island, Illinois, had the terms of his disciplinary order amended by the Board on January 11, 2013. On February 9, 2012, the Board charged Dr. Jauron with engaging in sexual misconduct with a female patient in Moline, Illinois, in October 2008, and being disciplined by the Illinois Department of Financial and Professional Regulation Division of Professional Regulation on April 20, 2011. A hearing was held before the Board on June 7, 2012, and a Decision was issued on August 14, 2012. The Board concluded that Dr. Jauron engaged in sexual misconduct with a female patient and was subsequently disciplined by the State of Illinois. The Board placed Dr. Jauron on indefinite probation subject to Board monitoring and ordered him to pay a \$10,000 fine. The Board ordered Dr. Jauron to have a female chaperone present at all times when treating female patients and to complete a Board-approved professional boundaries program. The Board also restricted Dr. Jauron's practice to the Department of the Army at the Rock Island Arsenal Medical Clinic. Under the terms of the January 11, 2013, Amended Order, Dr. Jauron's medical practice is no longer limited to the Department of the Army at the Rock Island Arsenal Medical Clinic, but he may only practice in a Board-approved practice setting and must seek prior written approval from Board before making any changes in his practice setting. All other terms of the Order remain the same.

[William J. Lee, M.D.](#), a 45-year-old Iowa-licensed physician who currently practices general surgery in Blue Earth, Minnesota, entered into a Consent Agreement with the Board and received a permanent Iowa medical license on January 18, 2013. On March 31, 1998, Dr. Lee was charged with driving under the influence of alcohol (DUI) in Kalamazoo, Michigan, and he subsequently pleaded guilty. On September 20, 2000, Dr. Lee's Michigan medical license was suspended for a period of six months and one day for failing to demonstrate completion of the continuing medical education required for license renewal. On July 25, 2001, Dr. Lee's Michigan license was reinstated and he was placed on probation for a period of one year. He was automatically discharged from probation at the end of the probationary period. On November 18, 2000, Dr. Lee was charged with DUI in Codington County, South Dakota, and he subsequently pleaded guilty. In 2002 Dr. Lee applied for a Minnesota medical license and he entered into a

participation agreement and monitoring plan with the Minnesota Health Professionals Services Program. Dr. Lee was issued a permanent Minnesota medical license on September 14, 2002. Dr. Lee completed the Minnesota Health Professionals Service Program on October 16, 2003, and was discharged from the program. On January 11, 2004, Dr. Lee was charged with DUI in Lyon County, Minnesota, and he subsequently pleaded guilty. On February 29, 2004, Dr. Lee entered an inpatient chemical dependency treatment program. On May 15, 2004, Dr. Lee entered into a Stipulated Agreement with the Minnesota Board and restrictions were placed on his Minnesota license. Dr. Lee successfully fulfilled the requirements of the Stipulated Agreement and on May 12, 2007, the Minnesota Board granted Dr. Lee an unconditional medical license. On December 29, 2004, Dr. Lee entered into a Stipulated Agreement with the South Dakota Board and was granted a permanent South Dakota medical license. The terms and conditions of the May 15, 2004, Stipulation and Order he entered into with the Minnesota Board were incorporated in the South Dakota Stipulated Agreement. Under the terms of the January 18, 2013, Consent Agreement Dr. Lee entered into with the Iowa Board Dr. Lee was issued a Citation and Warning for being charged with DUI on three separate occasions between March 31, 1998 and January 11, 2004, and for being disciplined by the Michigan, South Dakota and Minnesota medical boards.

When appropriate, disciplinary actions are reported to the National Practitioner Data Bank, an electronic repository administered by the U.S. Health Resources and Services Administration to track adverse license actions.
